General Information

Location

The driver education program and all 2008 summer school classes will be held at Lakes Community High School. Due to construction at Antioch High School, summer school will be at LCHS again this year.

Driver Education

Driver education programs will operate from Lakes High School. The dates for driver education are June 3 - July 25th. Please contact the corresponding school's guidance office for more information.

Registration

To register for summer school classes, submit the course selection and registration forms along with payment to either high school's guidance office. Registration must be received no later than noon on Friday, June 6, 2008.

Class Limits/Cancellations

Class registration is on a first-come, first-served basis. Early enrollment is important since classes are cancelled before the opening of summer school if there is insufficient registration. A minimum of 15 students must enroll in a class for it to be offered. Published class times are subject to change based upon enrollment.

Community High School District 117 students have first priority for enrollment purposes. Out-of-district students will not be confirmed for placement until Friday afternoon, June 6, 2008. It is the responsibility of out-of-district students to obtain prior approval for course work from their home district.

Summer School Calendar

Tuition and Fees

All courses are \$220 (per 1/2 credit). Full payment of tuition and fees is required at registration.

Refunds

No refunds will be made after June 6, 2008. Refunds will be issued only if the class is cancelled due to insufficient enrollment or extenuating circumstances as determined by the principal.

Meeting Times

Classes begin at 8 A.M. and conclude at 12:50 P.M. A 10-minute break is given at 10:15 A.M.

Attendance/Tardy Policy

Summer school is a voluntary program, but students are required to attend all classes. **Daily attendance is critical to a student's ability to be successful in summer school.** If a student is ill, the parent/guardian should contact the attendance secretary at 847-838-7100 before 7:50 A.M. the day of the absence.

Students must obtain an admit slip from the office if they are tardy. Repeated tardiness will be cause for dismissal from class without credit or refund.

NOTE: A limited amount of time is available to cover the required material in each course. Therefore, daily attendance is extremely important. **Students will be dropped after two absences.** To successfully complete summer school, students and parents must plan vacations and camps around school.

Bus Transportation

Buses will operate for 8 A.M. classes and 12:50 P.M. dismissals. **Students not arriving or leaving at these times must provide their own transportation.**

Student Transportation

Students who are licensed drivers may drive to summer school. Cars driven to campus should not be moved or entered until the students leave the campus at the end of their school day. **Students must park in the student parking lot east of Eagle Way. Violators will be ticketed or towed at the expense of the owner.** All vehicles parked on school grounds may be subject to search if the school administration suspects a violation of school rules. Students must register their vehicles with the main office on the first day of school.

Closed Campus

Lakes Community High School is a closed campus school. Students must remain in the building until their last classes are completed. Students who leave campus during a session or during break will be considered unexcused and could be dropped from the course with a loss of fees and credit.

Student Discipline

Rules and regulations of the regular school year are in effect according to District 117 policies. Students removed from class for disruptive or inappropriate behavior may be dropped from the school program with a loss of fees and credit.

Summer School Course Guide

Summer school courses are covered under two categories, enrichment/elective courses and make-up courses. Students will decide, with the help of their guidance counselors, what course(s) best suit their needs. With the exception of Summer Enrichment, all enrichment classes are 75 hours and provide opportunities to augment students' academic programs.

Enrichment/Elective Courses

Enrichment/elective courses are designed for students to enhance their skills in reading, English, and math as well as to augment a complete educational program.

Summer Enrichment (June 10 – July 1)

Enrichment 9, 1/2 credit

This course, formerly known as Title I, gives **incoming freshmen** a chance to become familiar with the high school environment and earn one-half elective credit. This specific enrichment program is **at no cost to the student** and is **offered to students by invitation only**. The program will focus on increasing skills in the areas of reading, writing, communication and mathematics. The program begins at 7:0 A.M. and ends at 12:50 P.M. for the entire duration of summer school.

Life Resource Management (June 10 – July 1)

Elective 10-12, 1 semester, 1/2 credit

This course fulfills the State of Illinois Consumer Education graduation requirement. This course includes classroom and laboratory experiences that develop goal-setting and decision-making skills in the areas of consumer economics, basic financial literacy, career planning, employability skills, and household management. (1/2 credit – \$220)

Art 2D (Two Dimension) (June 10 – July 1)

Elective 9-12, 1 semester, 1/2 credit

This course is a general introduction to drawing, painting, collage, sculpture, elements of art, principles of design, and art history. Emphasis will be placed on two-dimensional art forms. Some outside work may be required. (1/2 credit – \$220)

American Government (June 10 – July 1)

Elective 11-12, 1 semester, 1/2 credit

This course is designed to provide our students with the necessary knowledge and skills to participate effectively in the American political process. Students will gain a strong understanding of how federal and state governments operate, how the government's actions affect individuals, and the role of citizens in the democratic system. This class will prepare students for the required examinations on the Illinois and United States constitutions. (1/2 credit – \$220)

Computer Applications 1 (June 10 – July 1)

Elective 9-12, 1 semester, 1/2 credit

This course has been articulated with the CLC course **Keyboarding 170**. Computer Application 1 is the foundation for all computer classes in District 117. Students learn to keyboard by touch and how to set up documents to support their course work in District 117 and beyond. Students improve their speed and accuracy, manage files over a network, and work with graphics and templates in creating memos, letters, reports, desktop publishing documents and tables utilizing Microsoft Office Suite. (1/2 credit – \$220)

Health (June 10 – July 1)

Elective 9, 1 semester, _ credit

Fine Arts students have first priority for enrollment for this summer school course. Health education is a wellness-based class, which offers students an opportunity to develop life-long, healthy habits. Students will use problem-solving and critical thinking skills as they learn factual information to help them develop health behaviors. Topics include wellness, communicable and non-communicable diseases; medicines; digestion and nutrition; drug, alcohol, and tobacco issues; reproductive systems, and abstinence education. (1/2 credit – \$220)

Make-Up Courses

Make-up courses are designed for students to replace credits or courses failed during the regular school year. The cost of these classes is \$220 per 1/2 credit. For a complete course description, please refer to the Course Guide that is available in the guidance office of each high school or online.

English I (June 10 – June 26)

Make-Up 9, semester 1, 1/2 credit

This course is for freshmen who have failed semester 1 of English I during the regular school year. This course is designed to improve and expand their reading, writing, grammar, speaking and listening skills. (1/2 credit – \$220)

English I (June 30 – July 18)

Make-Up 9, semester 2, 1/2 credit

This course is for freshmen who have failed semester 2 of English I during the regular school year. This course is designed to improve and expand their reading, writing, grammar, speaking and listening skills. (1/2 credit – \$220)

English II (June 10 – June 26)

Make-Up 10, semester 1, 1/2 credit

This course is for sophomores who have failed semester 1 of English II during the regular school year. English II is designed to develop the student's ability to understand and appreciate the world of literature and ideas. (1/2 credit – \$220)

English II (June 30 – July 18)

Make-Up 10, semester 2, 1/2 credit

This course is for sophomores who have failed semester 2 of English II during the regular school year. English II is designed to develop the student's ability to understand and appreciate the world of literature and ideas. (1/2 credit – \$220)

English III (June 10 – June 26)

Make-Up 11, semester 1, 1/2 credit

This course is for juniors who have failed semester 1 of English III during the regular school year. English III will focus on the study of American literature with emphasis on writing skills. (1/2 credit – \$220)

English III (June 30 – July 18)

Make-Up 11, semester 2, 1/2 credit

This course is for juniors who have failed semester 2 of English III during the regular school year. English III will focus on the study of American literature with emphasis on writing skills. (1/2 credit – \$220)

Global Studies (June 10 – 26)

Make-Up 9, semester 1, 1/2 credit

Global Studies is a required course for District 117 students. This course is designed to help facilitate a better understanding of the political, economic, geographic, and societal influences that affect people. The content of this course will be based on a historical study of various regions around the world and how that history has influenced current trends. (1/2 credit – \$220)

Global Studies (June 30 – July 18)

Make-Up 9, semester 2, 1/2 credit

Global Studies is a required course for District 117 students. This course is designed to help facilitate a better understanding of the political, economic, geographic, and societal influences that affect people. The content of this course will be based on a historical study of various regions around the world and how that history has influenced current trends. (1/2 credit – \$220)

Physical Science (June 10 – 26)

Make-Up 9-12, semester 1, 1/2 credit

This course will help students learn applied math, applied writing and research skills used in science. The class has laboratory activities where students learn by doing. Topics in this course include the scientific method, problem solving, experimental design, chemical formulas and reactions, as well as the periodic table. The class will show students how to use these sciences in everyday life. (1/2 credit – \$220)

Physical Science (June 30 – 18)

Make-Up 9-12, semester 2, 1/2 credit

This course will help students learn applied math, applied writing and research skills used in science. The class has laboratory activities where students learn by doing. Topics in this course include the scientific method, problem solving, experimental design, chemical formulas and reactions, as well as the periodic table. The class will show students how to use these sciences in everyday life. (1/2 credit – \$220)

Algebra IA (June 10– June 26)

Make-Up 9-12, semester 1, 1/2 credit

The purpose of this course is to pave the way for a progressive mastery of skills necessary for understanding algebraic concepts. This course will afford the student more opportunities and time for engaging in activities that will facilitate the transition to more abstract ways of thinking. Topics will include variables and their uses, solving simple equations, problem solving strategies, statistics, and an introduction to graphing. A scientific calculator is required. Students will proceed to Algebra 1B. This two-year sequence would precede Geometry or Geometry Fundamentals. (1/2 credit – \$220)

Algebra IA (June 30 – July 18)

Make-Up 9-12, semester 2, 1/2 credit

The purpose of this course is to pave the way for a progressive mastery of skills necessary for understanding algebraic concepts. This

course will afford the student more opportunities and time for engaging in activities that will facilitate the transition to more abstract ways of thinking. Algebra I (June 10 – June 26)

Make-Up 9-12, semester 1, 1/2 credit

This course is an introduction to Algebra topics including the theory behind some of the concepts. Preparatory Classes

AP Calculus (BC) Preparatory (June 10 – June 27)

Prep, 10-12, no credit

8 a.m. – 11 a.m.

In order to meet the demands of a rigorous Calculus BC course, this session will begin the Calculus BC curriculum. The goal is to facilitate a successful transition into the school year. Topics will include limits; continuity; graphical, numerical, and analytical concept of the derivative; methods for computing derivatives; and calculating and interpreting higher order derivatives. (no credit - \$25)
